TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:

As a parent of a two-year-old and a six-year-old, one-word rings throughout the house frequently as they play together. That word is "mine." Despite all of the disciplining, that word somehow pushes its way to the surface as they hold tightly to the thing they want most. Of course, we know it's due to our fallen nature, yet; the same word creeps in slowly as we labor to advance God's kingdom.

The mindset of "mine" is the quickest way to quench the Spirit of God moving through our city. The story of Jesus feeding the five thousand is no stranger to us. If we aren't careful, the story becomes just a tool to teach people how to be generous or trust God when they have very little. These are great truths, but when was the last time you read this through the lens of your church? The disciples said, "We have here only five loaves of bread and two fish." As they looked upon the great need of the hungry people, they didn't believe what they had was enough. It's easy to look upon the vast city of Houston and think to ourselves, like the disciples did, that what we have isn't enough. However, as we know from the story, something miraculous happened when the disciples released what was in their hands to the people. What once wasn't enough... multiplied and became more than enough.

Releasing is challenging. Dying to the notion of "mine" is even more difficult. However, both are necessary to aid a spiritual renewal in our city.

We may feel like we need more people, time, or resources but what's in our hands is enough. We can be part of a multiplying miracle when we release what has been stewarded to us and place it in God's hands.

We have a city of people starving for the gospel. God is asking us to rest in His sufficiency and release what's in our hands till every man, woman, and child hears the good news!

TODAY'S PRAYER FOR GOD'S PEOPLE:

Father, you are so good and full of grace. We thank you that you are sufficient in all things. We long to see you continue to move in our city. Would you help us die to ourselves daily and place your agenda above ours.
